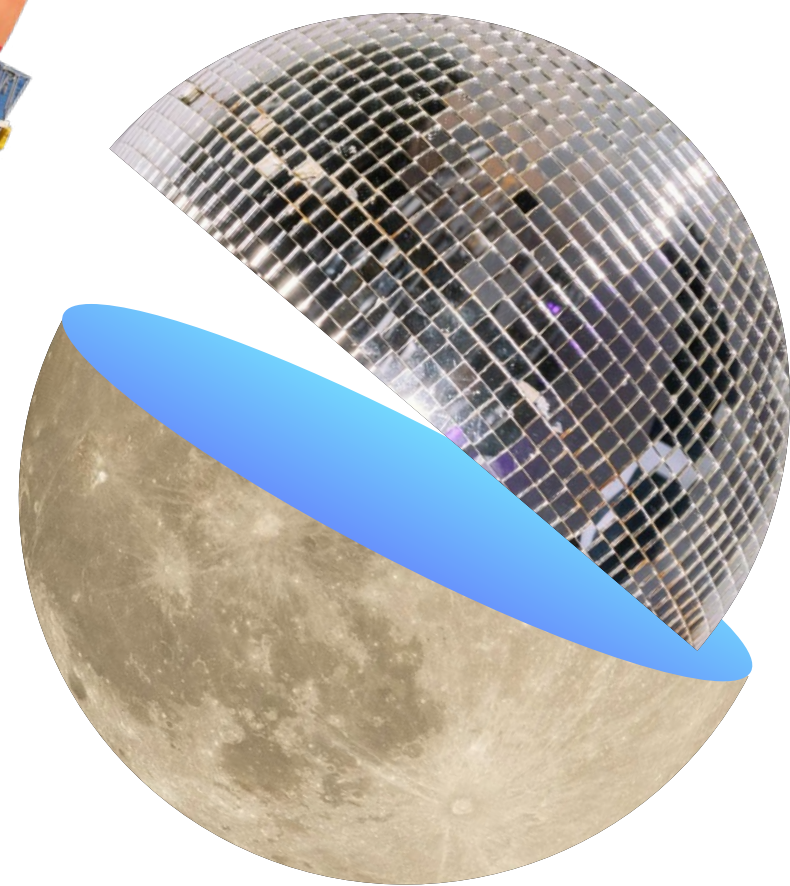

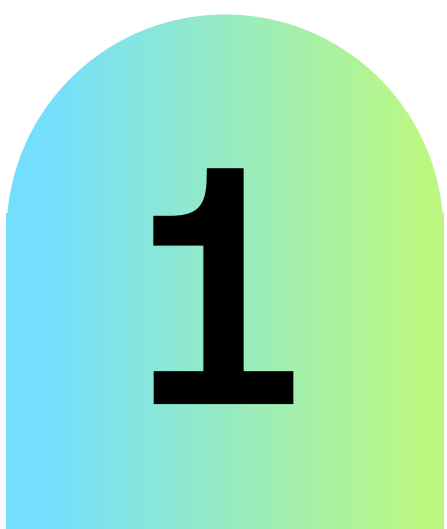

A note from our Director



Welcome to our action-packed 2025 Schools Programme!

With rates of reading for enjoyment amongst children currently at an all-time low, we know how difficult it can be to generate excitement for books – and that the incredible advocacy of teachers and librarians like you has never been more important in encouraging young people to open their minds and hearts to books, and all the knowledge, comfort, and delight they can offer throughout their lives.

In creating the most memorable, joyful – and educational – events for pupils of all ages, we hope we can help you fight the corner for the written word. Whether you'll be visiting for the first time this year, or you're a Festival regular, you'll find plenty to ignite imaginations, spark creativity, and inspire wonder.

We want to make sure that as many schools as possible get to enjoy our vibrant programme, so since last year we've consulted with teachers and librarians who brought pupils to our 2024 Festival about how we could best support them, and others. These conversations highlighted that the biggest challenge for many schools was the cost of transport to the Festival site, which in some cases was thousands of pounds.

So, to increase the amount of travel supporting funding available to bring schools to site from near and far, we're introducing a small ticket price of £4 per pupil. This change will also ensure that all attending pupils still leave their visit with a free book to treasure.

But we never want ticket cost to be a barrier to experiencing the Festival and our fantastic authors, so as well as applying for our transport fund, teachers and librarians can also apply for free tickets for pupils whose families are unable to cover ticket costs. We believe that this approach will enable even more young people to attend the Festival whilst maintaining free access to those who need it, and as a charity we are hugely grateful to our Supporters for making this, and our overall Schools Programme, possible.

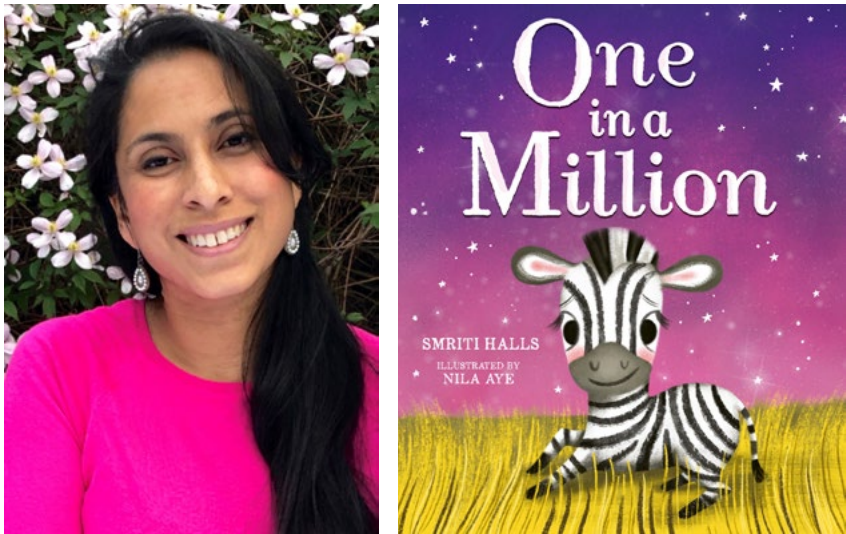
Tuesday 19 August: Events for all ages

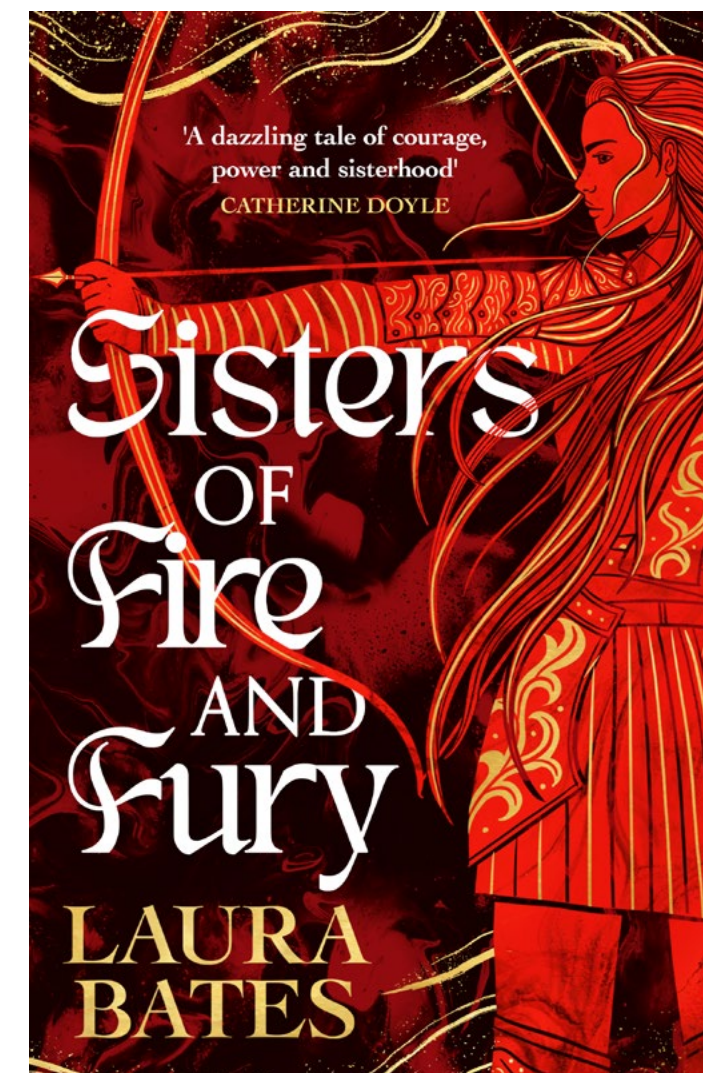


Thursday 21 August: Secondary Schools Teen Takeover Day

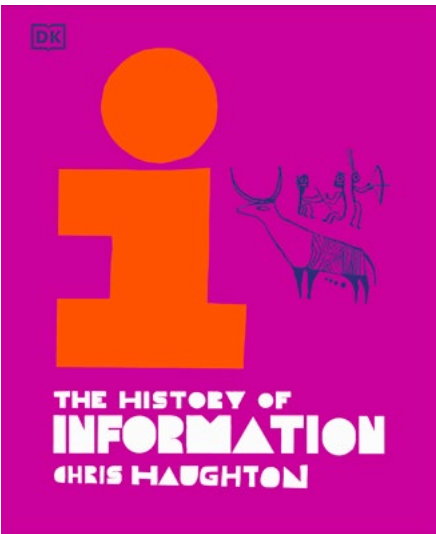

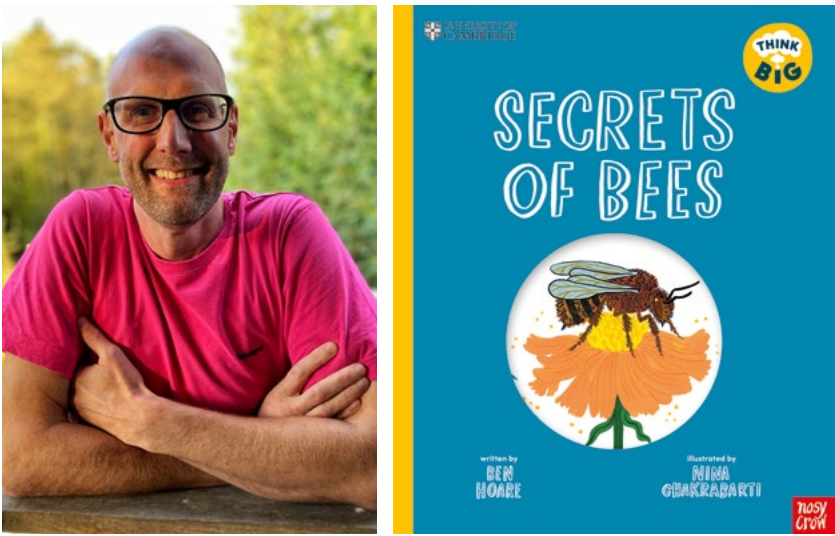

Booking opens Monday 28 April

Tickets are £4 per pupil (with a free adult ticket for every 10 pupil tickets), and allocated on a first come, first served basis. Help is available for transport via our travel fund, and you can also register for free tickets if cost is a barrier for any pupils.

Booking a visit for your class is easy! Simply follow these steps:



1. Browse the Schools Programme and pick out the event(s) you would like to attend.
2. From Monday 28 April, complete our online booking form to submit your ticket request, and any transport fund or free tickets applications, at learning.edbookfest.co.uk/tickets.
3. Take note: the deadline for submitting booking forms, or letting us know of any changes or issues with previously submitted forms, is Thursday 13 June.
4. Our Schools Booking Coordinator will notify you once your tickets have been allocated, and provide you with further information regarding the cost of your booking and payment options. You will have the chance to confirm you would like to proceed.
5. Get ready for your visit to the Book Festival using our tips on p5!

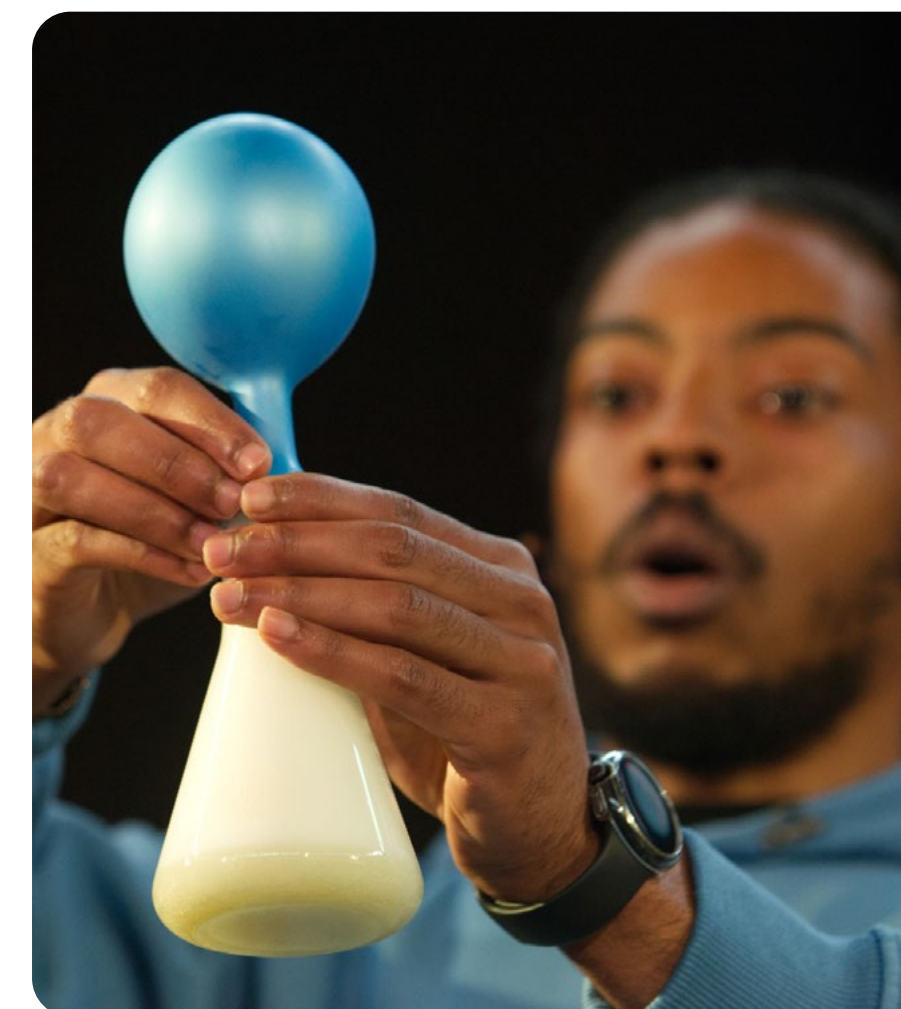
📺 Watching online:

Book for free from Tuesday 10 June

Selected Schools events are available to watch via online livestream, or on demand following the event. To join us online:

1. Register or log in to your account at edbookfest.co.uk/login.

Accessibility

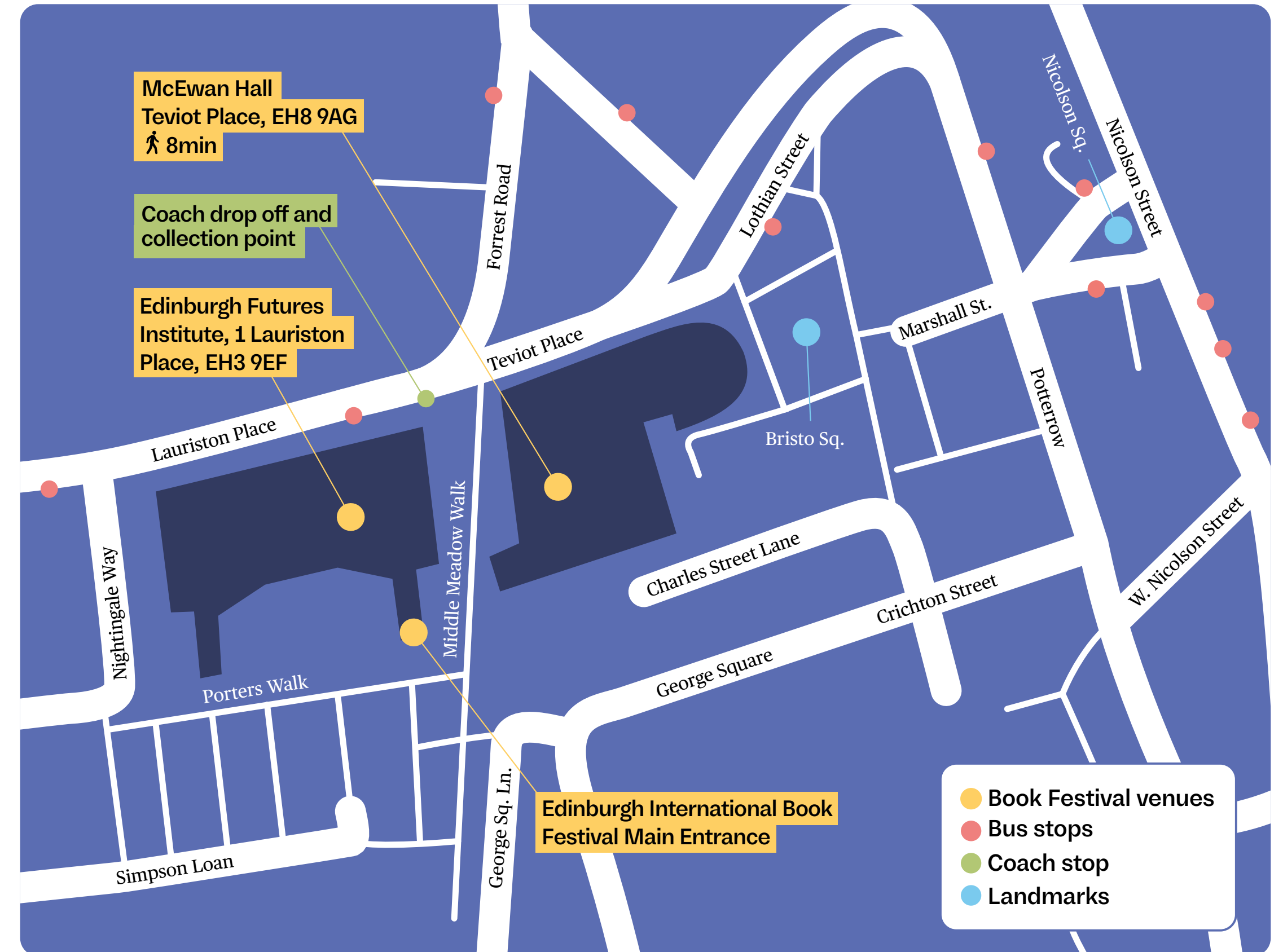
The Book Festival is wheelchair accessible and there are infrared and/or audio induction loop systems in our theatres. You can also request a BSL interpreter for any event in the programme - just do let us know as soon as you have booked tickets. Please do get in touch with us if your class has specific access requirements at schools@edbookfest.co.uk.

Pre-visit

- Don't forget to apply for transport funding and any free tickets required at your time of booking.
- Once your booking is confirmed, you'll receive an email with a helpful information pack covering key information and a photos permission form. A risk assessment document is also available on request.

Your visit

- All of our Schools events take place at our main Festival site at Edinburgh Futures Institute, apart from **Take On Tinseltown with Frank Cottrell-Boyce and Steven Lenton**, and **Women Are Legends Too: Reimagining Fantasy with Laura Bates**, both of which take place at McEwan Hall (see locations map opposite).
- Each event lasts for 45 minutes, with authors appearing live on stage.
- Each pupil attending in-person will receive a FREE book related to the event. Keep your class around post-event for the chance to get these signed by the author.
- Visit the Discovery Zone, located in the Lounge on Level 2, on Wednesday 20 and Thursday 21 for activities galore.
- Packed lunches can be enjoyed outside in our grassy courtyards or in one of our cosy indoor spots if the weather is unkind.
- The Festival Bookshop, brought to you by Waterstones, is packed full of more titles from every author in the programme. Don't forget you can bulk order with a discount (see p5 for details)!

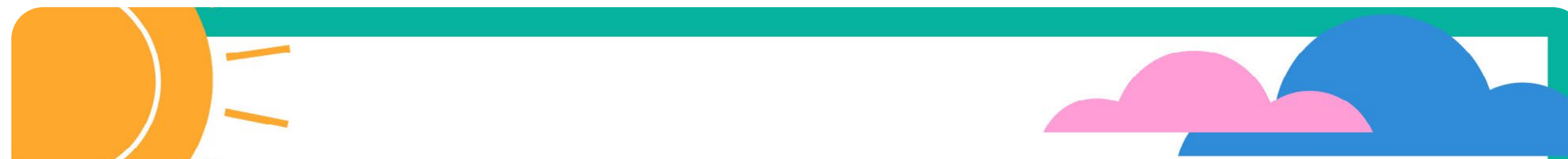
